The past year has been a year of continued growth, as we've expanded outreach efforts to reach thousands more.

Young AmeriTowne On the Road brought financial literacy to students in Pueblo, Grand Junction, Fort Collins, Durango and the Denver metro area. With two versions up and running, more than 31,000 students participated in an AmeriTowne program last year, a true legacy that is now reaching a second generation of participants.

Strategic efforts to empower youth to think creatively and build new businesses are working. Our expanded YouthBiz entrepreneurial programming engages more youth, particularly those facing academic, social and/or economic barriers to success. Our new YouthBiz Out of the Box program provides real-world business experience for middle school students.

We also continue to innovate our award-winning programs.

International Towne increasingly utilizes technology to support program curriculum and make information more accessible to

teachers and students.

Finally, this year we launched Spark Change, a service learning and leadership development program, offering students the chance to decide how they want to make a difference in their community.

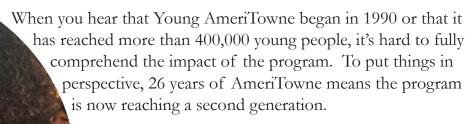

Young AmeriTowne: A hands-on lesson in free enterprise

AmeriTowne alum now a parent volunteer



A recent parent volunteer, Jamie, attended
AmeriTowne herself as a fifth grader. Over 20 years
after she first set foot in Towne square, she said,
"Young AmeriTowne is amazing. I truly enjoyed
my experience as a fifth grader years ago, and each
time I come it gets better and better. These are lifelong lessons and experiences here. I'm so proud to
be a part of it!" Jamie's son Tristin had heard all about
AmeriTowne from his mother and older brother, and
couldn't wait to participate himself. An employee of the
Warehouse, Tristin delivered all the products sold in Towne and
engraved dog-tags to fulfill customer orders.

Remarkably, this story is not unique. More and more adults attended the program, and continued expansion of AmeriTowne will make this experience even more common. Someday, Tristin may even volunteer with his own children in Towne, ensuring they, too will be ready for the real world.

International Towne: A hands-on lesson in global economics

What moves you?

When students are truly interested in what they are doing, the best learning occurs. The International Towne program embodies this principle by offering students a wide array of jobs and responsibilities that cater to all different learning styles.

Take the country of India, as an example. Citizens working there create a documentary film around the theme, "What moves you?" They prepare a storyline, interview students and edit footage, perfect tasks for students interested in media and digital arts.

Singapore's roles, on the other hand, appeal to students interested in finance. Clerks distribute student salaries and Tellers exchange currency and collect credit card payments. In fact, at least 75% of the students must pay their credit card bill for Singapore to have a positive balance of payments.

This one-of-a-kind program engages middle school students and prepares them for a role in today's global economy.

YouthBiz: Life lessons through entrepreneurship

YouthBiz starts a new chapter: growing beyond Five Points

In 1992, after a summer of record youth violence in Denver, eight young people joined forces with a community leader to create a solution—YouthBiz. Their goal was to advance the social and economic prosperity of youth through the study and practice of entrepreneurship.

Since those noble yet humble beginnings, YouthBiz has changed the trajectory of over 5,000 youth living Denver, particularly in the Five Points neighborhood. Program participants learn resiliency, leadership and self-worth while developing a business. After completing the program, 13-year-old

Greta wrote, "YouthBiz taught me how important it was to be my own spokesperson, and be bold and be the person that is willing to stand up and speak."

With the transition from a site-based to a school-based model, YouthBiz has outgrown its current building in Five Points. Local youth-serving organizations have magnified this expansion, bringing YouthBiz into the schools, community centers and neighborhoods where it is needed most. In 2016, this collaboration fueled the continued growth of YouthBiz StartUp and launched a new program, Out of the Box, which provides students with real business experience.

To be able to reach more students, YouthBiz will be moving into a new entreprenurial center this fall.

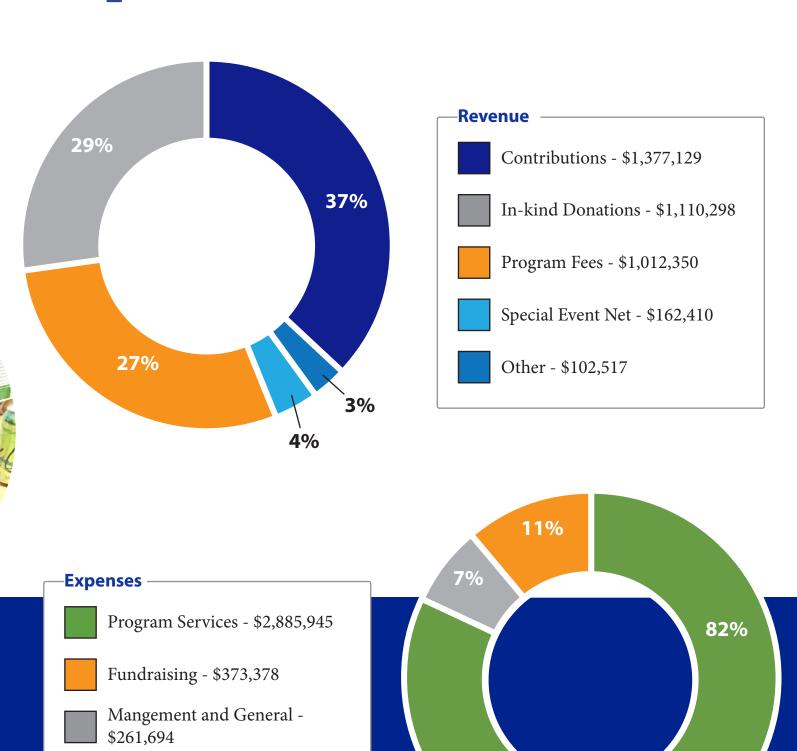

Send-a-School Program

Send-a-School is an important initiative to help us achieve our shared vision to build a Colorado where every student, regardless of background, knows how to earn, make and manage his or her money wisely.

Since 2004, the program has provided scholarship funds for low-income students to attend Young AmeriTowne and/or International Towne education programs. In 2016, 7,929 deserving students from 90 schools received \$98,136 in financial aid thanks to your generous support. On average these schools were 66% low income, defined as 50% of more of students are eligible for the Federal free/reduced lunch program.

The results and impact are widespread. Kora Fleming, 5th grade teacher, Montview Elementary School (84% students eligible for FRL) shares, "There's a job here in Young AmeriTowne for everybody. Even the students who struggle and have few opportunities for success can do their Young AmeriTowne job.

Afterward, my students see themselves as future workers. They really believe "I can be a manager. I can be an accountant." Thank you for this scholarship."
